

IN THE HEAT WITH THE TAYLOR FIRE RESCUE

The members of Taylor Fire Rescue come from all sorts of backgrounds and volunteer their time to help our community. Our fire department trains to meet and exceed the BC Structure Firefighter Standards level of Full-Service Firefighter, which includes, Firefighter level 2, First Responder and Hazmat Operations qualifications. This month we would like to introduce to you a couple of our members.

Acting Lieutenant Josh Carrell has been a member of the Fire Department since October 2011. He was promoted to Acting Lieutenant earlier this year and has stepped up into an Instructor role to help train our probationary crews. A/Lt. Carrell has been involved with the truck committee for many years and sits on the Taylor Firefighters' Association Executive Board. Josh works full-time at the North Peace Airport as an Airport Technician which specializes in Aircarft Fire Rescue Response and Airfield Maintenance. He and his family can usually be seen helping at fire department events like parades, barbeques and other occasions within the community.





Firefighter Ed Fornelli joined our department in September 2012. He came to us with many years of experience with the McMahon Plant Emergency Response Team. His skills and expertise include Hazardous Materials, Industrial Firefighting, and Rope Rescue. Firefighter Fornelli completed the NPFA 1001 Firefighter level 2 program and did extra coursework to complete his Fire Officer 1 certificate. Firefighter Fornelli has an exceptional athletic background including national soccer, provincial hockey, and Ironman Triathlons. Ed is now retired and spends the summer months in Green Lake, BC where he also holds the position of Deputy Fire Chief for Watch Lake - North Green Lake Volunteer Fire Department.


Public Notice – Public Alerts TESTING!

Driveway Snow Clearing



As per the Snow Removal and Ice Control Policy, snow is cleared from designated driveways in accordance with the Plowing Schedule priorities and other unscheduled municipal emergencies that may occur. Those desiring to have this free service and meet the criteria, **need to apply annually**.

Who can apply?

If you are 65 years of age or older, or have a condition that makes you unable to perform driveway clearing, and there is no able bodied person living in your residence that can perform the snow clearing duty, you may apply. To apply, you may either come into the District of Taylor Municipal Office at 10007 – 100 A Street along with your ID and fill out an application or due to COVID-19, you may call in at 250-789-3392 to take advantage of this free service.

Residential and Commercial Driveways

The District of Taylor utilizes the boulevard areas for snow storage. Placing snow on District owned roads from residential properties will only add to the Districts snow storage area or it may be carried over onto the neighboring yard, adding to their snow storage area. Individual residential driveway snow should be kept on the property that it originated. If this is an issue, the District of Taylor provides residential and commercial properties an area to take excess driveway snow. This snow dump area is located at 10347 – Cherry Avenue East, just past the Golf Course Maintenance Yard. Please obey all of the information posted at this site.

Placing snow on public roadways is a safety concern. Snow piles on roadways are not always clearly seen. They may impede or deviate traffic flow, affect emergency vehicle response and cause potential danger for pedestrians. Public Works strives to provide safe passage for motorists and pedestrians on roads and sidewalks, which can be obstructed when snow from residential driveways is put on District roads.

District of Taylor Sani-Dump Area Operation

The RV sani-dump located behind the Taylor Hotel is a free to use service with a potable water fill station.

The sani-dump is open from the May long weekend through to the Thanksgiving long weekend in October. If the weather is uncooperating and begins to freeze, the opening may be prolonged and/or it may close sooner.

All users are encouraged to be courteous and respectful of this service so that it may continue.


Do you have a culvert or a ditch in front of your property?



As ditches and culverts form a key part of the District's drainage system, they should not be obstructed under any circumstances. Accumulation of debris can lead to blockage of the pipe and thereby prevent the free flow of water that will eventually overflow the ditch. As well, water flows are affected by culverts that are damaged, commonly by being ran over by vehicles and/or equipment.

Fall is a good time to verify if there is any accumulated dirt, leaves or any form of debris at the entrance or exit of the culvert pipe. In addition, make sure to mow the grass shorter in front of the entrance to ensure proper water flow in the ditch.

IMPROVING ACCESSIBILITY ACROSS NORTHEASTERN BC

The new Northeastern BC Accessibility Plan will help embed accessibility in local government practices and improve outcomes for people with disabilities across the region.

The Peace River Regional District, Northern Rockies Regional Municipality, and member municipalities across the region worked together to create the Northeastern BC Accessibility Plan. This Plan supports collaborative and efficient efforts to improve accessibility and ensures that communities across the region meet the requirements of the provincial *Accessible BC Act*.

The Accessibility Plan includes a shared vision, priorities for action, and an initial set of goals for the region. The District of Taylor will create a tailored implementation plan based on the priorities and goals laid out in the collaborative plan.

To ensure a consistent approach to accessibility across the region, a shared Northeastern BC Accessibility Committee has been established. The Committee includes staff representatives from the member communities as well as people living in the region who have disabilities, or work with organizations that serve people with disabilities.

The Committee will also help partner organizations implement the requirements of the *Accessible BC Act* and foster collaboration and cooperation, sharing and pooling of resources, and avoid duplication of work. The committee's first meeting was held September 14, 2023.

Accessible BC Act

The Accessible BC Act (2021) is provincial legislation that sets out a path for British Columbia to become more accessible. The Act establishes requirements for provincial services and public organizations, including local governments. These requirements include creating accessibility plans, establishing accessibility committees, and creating a way for the public to provide feedback on accessibility measures.





On average 77 people die every year in crashes where distracted driving is a contributing factor.


The use of hand-held personal electronic devices while driving has been banned in B.C. since 2010.



The law also applies while you're stopped at a red light or slowed in traffic.

If you have your L or N, you're not allowed to use any personal electronic devices, even with a hands-free system.





The penalty is the fine and four penalty points for one distracted driving ticket.

*As of Jnuary 1, 2022, four penalty points result in a Driver Penalty Point Premium of \$214 if this is your first offence in the past three years.

Handy Dart Services

Is Handy Dart right for me?

handyDART is an accessible, door-to-door shared transit service for people with permanent or temporary disabilities that prevent them from using fixed-route transit without assistance from another person. handyDART picks you up at your accessible door and drops you off at the accessible door of your destination. Customers must first register, at no charge, for this program.

handyDART is part of the Accessible Services offered from your local transit service. Many handyDART customers use a combination of fixed-route and handyDART services depending on their travel needs and destination.

Two types of accessible transit service are offered: shared door-to-door handyDART service and fixed-route service. Fixed-route service includes either low-floor buses with ramps, or lift-equipped buses on fixed routes and schedules.

Fixed-route buses have securements for wheelchairs or scooters. To check if a stop is accessible, call your local transit office. Customers using wheelchairs or scooters, registered handyDART customers or CNIB pass holders may travel with an attendant. Attendants travel free and must board and exit at the same stop as the customer requiring assistance and help load and secure mobility aids on the bus.

How to book a trip

You must first be registered with handyDART before booking a trip. Subscription trips are scheduled once a week or more at the same location and time for an extended period. An example would be a biweekly physical therapy appointment. To request this service, you must contact handyDART to check availability. Subscription trips are cancelled on holidays. Renal patients should check with the hospital and handyDART for holiday service. You must contact handyDART if you need to keep a trip on a holiday.

Booking Check List

When you book a trip, please have this information ready:

- Your name
- The day, date and time you need to travel
- Identify if you have an attendant or companion or an assistance animal
- Your pick-up address street name and number
- Your drop-off address street name and number and phone number if available
- Your appointment time
- Any special instructions (e.g. side door)
- Type of mobility aid you will be using (wheelchair, walker, etc.)

Reservation trips are one time or occasional trips. These trips are scheduled on a first-to-call basis. You need to book a trip in advance of the date required but no more than 14 days in advance.

handyDART resources are limited and always in demand. If you must cancel a trip, it is important that you call the handyDART office as soon as you can. By cancelling as far in advance as possible, you help us improve service to all our passengers.

BC Bus North Services

BC Bus North offers weekly bus schedules between Dawson Creek and Fort Nelson, with stops in communities such as Taylor, Fort St. John, Wonowon, Pink Mountain, Buckinghorse River Lodge, and Prophet River.

BC Bus North's schedule is designed to conveniently connect residents and visitors to the Northern Rockies area. Whether you're visiting friends and family, travelling for work, or just taking in the sights, see below for our bus schedule between Dawson Creek and Fort Nelson.

Reservations

Online Bookings: The cutoff for purchasing tickets online is 24 hours prior to departure.

Phone Bookings: Passengers booking over the phone must book at least 3 hours prior to departure. Phone bookings can be made daily between 8:00 am and 5:00 pm at 1-844-564-7494.

Walk-up Tickets: We recommend booking in advance, however, passengers may show up at a stop and pay the driver (debit or credit card only) based on availability. Cash is not accepted.

Arrive at the bus stop on time

Arrive at the designated pick-up location 15-20 minutes prior to departure. Buses operate on a schedule and cannot wait for late passengers. Consequently, missing bus results in rescheduling and paying for a new reservation.

Cancellation

Please cancel your ticket a minimum of 24 hours in advance to receive a full refund.

In the event that BC Bus North cancels your trip, reservations are refunded.

Please note we have a special cancellation policy due to COVID-19 concerns. With this in mind, if you cancel within the 24-hour notice period, we'll approve it and offer a future travel credit.

Transfers

This independent service has no connections or transfers to other bus services.

Ticket Vendors

Purchase tickets by phone or online. In particular, for debit payments please contact the call center. Additionally, at this time, there are no retail outlets, offices or physical addresses to purchase tickets from.

Schedules

BC Bus North provides a convenient bus between Prince George and Fort St. John, with two departures per week in each direction. Our Prince George/Fort St. John bus service stops at the following locations: Bear Lake BP Gas Station, McLeod Lake General Store, Mackenzie Junction, Mackenzie Recreation Centre, Azouzetta Lake Lodge and Cabins, Chetwynd Petro Canada, Groundbirch Race Trac Gas Station and Store, Dawson Creek Co-op Mall, and Taylor Esso. BC Bus North operates from Prince George to Fort St. John on Monday and Tuesday, while the return trip operates on Wednesday and Thursday.
